ADMINISTRATIVE ORDER

WHEREAS, Supreme Court Rule 202.5 provides that the Chief Justice, by administrative order, may temporarily waive certain bar admissions and regulatory requirements due to the existence of an emergency affecting the justice system in the U.S. Virgin Islands; and

WHEREAS, Supreme Court Rule 202(d) provides that the special admission provided by Rule 202 expires after two years unless, on or before the last day of the eighteenth month of the attorney's two-year term, the specially-admitted attorney files a complete application for regular admission, including payment of all attendant fees and, if not eligible for admission by motion or score transfer, actually sits for the Virgin Islands Bar Exam, in which case the specially-admitted attorney shall have his or her special admission extended for one additional year; and

WHEREAS, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the in-person administration of the bar examination scheduled for July 2020 was cancelled and replaced with a remote bar examination scheduled for October 5-6, 2020; and

WHEREAS, as a result of the cancellation of the July 2020 bar examination and without the intervention of this Court, certain specially-admitted attorneys will not be eligible to receive the additional third year of special admissions due to the inability to sit for the bar exam;

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS ORDERED, that the provisions of Supreme Court Rule 202(d) are **HEREBY TEMPORARILY WAIVED**, and replaced with the following modified procedures:

1. (a) Any specially-admitted attorney in the second year of admission who was required

to register and sit for the July 2020 administration of the Virgin Islands Bar

Examination to receive a third year of special admission shall receive that additional

year of admission if he or she timely registers and sits for either the October 2020

remote administration or the February 2021 in-person administration. The additional

year of admission shall begin upon the expiration of the two-year term of special

admission, and shall be granted *nunc pro tunc* to any specially-admitted attorney whose

special admission expired between March 23, 2020, and the date of entry of this Order.

(b) A specially-admitted attorney who receives an extension under this rule but fails to

timely register for the exam will have their admission automatically terminate on the

original date his or her special admission was set to expire or the day after the deadline

for timely registration for the February 2021 exam, whichever is later.

(c) A specially-admitted attorney who receives an extension under this rule and timely

registers for the exam, but fails to sit for either the October 2020 or February 2021

administrations, will have their admission automatically terminate on the original date

his or her special admission was set to expire or the first day of the February 2021

exam, whichever is later.

(d) A specially-admitted attorney who receives an extension under this rule and fails

the October 2020 exam will be required to register and sit for the February 2021 exam

in order to maintain the extended admission. A specially-admitted attorney who fails

to do so will have their admission automatically terminate on the original date his or

her special admission was set to expire or the day after the deadline for timely

registration for the February 2021 exam, whichever is later.

2. Any specially-admitted attorney in the third year of admission or whose special

admission expired between March 23, 2020, and the date of entry of this Order shall

remain specially admitted through expiration of their three-year admission or through

April 30, 2021, whichever is longer. This extension shall be granted nunc pro tunc

with respect to any qualifying specially-admitted attorney whose special admission

already expired.
