GOVERNMENT OF THE UNITED STATES VIRGIN ISLANDS' MOTION FOR LEAVE TO FILE BRIEF IN EXCESS OF PAGE LIMIT

The Government of the United States Virgin Islands ("Government") hereby respectfully

moves for leave to exceed the page limit set forth in V.I. R. Civ. P. 6-1(e)(2) with respect to its

Opposition to Defendants' Motion to Dismiss the First Amended Complaint. In support of this

request, the Government states as follows.

Pursuant to Rule 6-1(e)(2), the Government's Opposition is not to exceed the greater of

20 pages or 6,000 words in length unless leave of the Court is obtained in advance for a longer

submission. The Government seeks leave to file a 36-page Opposition.

Defendants' Motion to Dismiss is 32 pages, which is well in excess of the applicable limit.¹ The over-length motion raises at least 14 different substantive arguments as grounds for dismissal of the Government's claims under the Criminally Influenced and Corrupt Organizations ("CICO") Act, 14 V.I.C. §§ 601 *et seq.*, and under the common law. Some of Defendants' arguments—such as that punitive damages are prohibited against an estate, *see* Motion at 30-32—raise questions of first impression in the Virgin Islands. Others—such as that the Government's claims are untimely, *see* Motion at 15-16, and that the Government fails to plead predicate acts, *see* Motion at 16-17—are made in a cursory manner, but require a more developed response addressing the relevant Complaint allegations, statutory provisions, and case law that the Government believes support its claims.

Given the expansive scope of the Motion to Dismiss, the complexity of the issues raised, and the Government's need to answer in full each argument raised in the 32-page motion, the Government respectfully requests leave under Rule 6-1(e)(2) to file a 36-page Opposition. *See*, *e.g., Walker v. Watergate Villas West*, No. ST-13-CV-489, 2017 WL 2984026, at *3 (V.I. Super. Ct. July 11, 2017) (granting leave to file 32-page brief in support of discovery motion challenging 16 of opposing party's interrogatory responses); *Bass v. Federal Express Corp.*, No. SC-14-CV-60, 2016 WL 3892394, at *1 (V.I. Super. Ct. July 13, 2016) (granting leave to file 30-page brief in opposition to motion for summary judgment).

WHEREFORE, the Government respectfully requests that this Honorable Court grant its Motion for Leave.

¹ The Court has not yet ruled on Defendants' Motion for Leave to Exceed Page Limit, which Defendants filed on March 17, 2020 concurrently with their over-length Motion to Dismiss.
